# PASTORAL LETTER

## THE ROOT OF THANKS

*Rejoice always, pray without ceasing,  
give thanks in all circumstances;  
for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.  
1 Thessalonians 5:16-18*

Always? In all circumstances? Really? One can understand why this may make sense if it is true that there is a silver lining in every cloud. But, frankly, some clouds are dark as coal. Then again, one can see a place for gratitude in God's bringing good out of evil. Redemption, the forgiveness of sins and the gift of eternal life, through the suffering and death of our Lord Jesus Christ is the ultimate example and the source of all hope. Christ is risen! And, so . . .

*We know that all things work together for good  
for those who love God,  
who are called according to his purpose.  
Romans 8:28*

But, the command to Christians is not only to give thanks "in" all circumstances, but also "for" all things.

*Always give thanks to God the Father for every-  
thing, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.  
Ephesians 5:20*

This strikes me as being "over the top." What does this mean? How can we do this? And, for heaven's sake, why? Whether one's life is made of islands of happiness in a sea of sorrow or the other way around, still, there is plenty of pain, sorrow, injustice and evil to go around. What does it mean for a Christian to "rejoice always" and to give thanks in and for "all things?" I think it has something to do with Jesus.

No matter what happens then, I give thanks for the Grace of God in Christ that swallows up

death—that "nothing can separate me from the love of God in Christ Jesus my Lord." I can "suffer the loss of all things (as indeed we all shall) in order that I may gain Christ."





# Session Notes

Session Notes from October 20, 2015

At an early October called session meeting, members were delighted to welcome Bruce and Peggy Chamberlain into our Trinity family. Everyone welcomes these two new members with open arms.

At Session's stated meeting our Temporary Pastor Jerry Foust passed out "The Eight Concepts of Bowen Theory" by Roberta M. Gilbert, M.D. and introduced session members to the book and its author. With a reading assignment for the next meeting in November, elders and our deacon moderator will be prepared to study and discuss new ways of thinking about the individual and the group.

Session approved Bobby Whipple's move from Mission Committee to the Growth & Outreach Team. Doug Holland and Sheila Sievert were approved as co-chairs for the Mission Committee.

Leone Mohny gave a full report about the doings of the recent Presbytery de Cristo meeting in Silver City. She also informed the elders that around 50 Ryan's Bears are being prepared for their blessing and future service to children and youth during illness or special need. Busy lady that she is, Leone then informed session that from January 2015 to September 2015 the budget shortfall is \$33,625.08. If your pledge giving is behind, now is the time to catch up.

Session approved transferring \$5,000 from the Special Mission Fund to the Resource Center to cover the startup cost deficit. Also, approval was obtained to add a new line item to the chart of accounts to be known as the Capital Maintenance-Parking Lot. With city approval Trinity will move forward to build a secure, monitored parking lot with landscape, change of egress and entrance and smooth pavement in the future. Session approved spending \$1,400 from the Memorial Fund for medical supplies to update and replenish Trinity's first aid and emergency equipment.

For the Worship Committee, Session approved a designated gift of \$1,000 from the Memorial Fund to purchase a new Christmas tree and some advent banners. Also, approval was given to cancel the 8:00 am worship service on December 20<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> because of the Cantata performance and the holiday week.

Christian Education has ordered advent calendars for the children. Donated books for children are being catalogued in the Lovejoy Library. And books are being acquired for the 2016 sermon series about the Apostle's Creed and the Lord's Prayer.

The Deacons are training to learn about taking Home Communion to Trinity's homebound. They are also updating the church directory with phone numbers and other statistics.

Mission Committee is excited about launching Fourth Friday on 4<sup>th</sup> Avenue Community Supper. Session prayed for the success of this event.

Gratitude was expressed to Alice Smedley, Peter Holbrook, Kyle Lane and Maria Andrade for their work to make the October 16<sup>th</sup> Homeless Connect event a success.



## The National Youth Worker's Conference

Rona and I recently attended the National Youth Worker's Conference in San Diego put on by Youth Specialties. This was a four day conference, October 8 to 11, that was filled with worship (with about 2000 of our closest friends) and breakout sessions covering various topics related to Youth Ministry. Rona and I both enjoyed these sessions very much and left with our heads spinning with wonderful and very useful information.

Rona's highlights are as follows: A talk on Faith, Science, and Understanding which she said was a fascinating look at how Science and Faith can coexist. She also attended the Impactful Outreach to Youth (who couldn't care less about Jesus) session and learned a lot of strategies to engage young adults in faith from a very engaging speaker. She learned a lot of very applicable information that she can use towards high school/college age ministry.

One seminar I truly enjoyed was Helping Teens follow Jesus in a World that Doesn't. The speaker focused on having the students create their own personal identification first and then showing them the love of Jesus. He also said that teens need to know that God first loved them before talking about transforming behaviors. I also attended a seminar on Middle School 101 and 201 which were my two favorites. I learned that Middle School ministry forms the foundation of faith for teens and that this time period is where the students start being able to ask the "why" questions for their faith. Finally, these sessions reminded me that my job is to keep my ministry focused on God while leading my students to become the faithful leaders that they are capable of becoming.

This was a very worthwhile conference and with God's help and Trinity's help, Rona and I are better equipped to do our ministry. I would like to extend a thank you for allowing us to attend this conference and I hope you are as excited as we are to see what God plans to unfold within our ministry.

## DISASTER RELIEF



**Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) responds to Southeast coastal flooding.**

*Help those in need*

The Southeast coast is experiencing severe and unprecedented flooding. At its height, more than 400 roads, 150 bridges and two major interstates (I-20 and I-95) were closed, isolating the communities that were most in need of comfort and assistance. South Carolina has borne the brunt of the devastation, enduring what has been described as a 1,000-year flood, and for some, more is still to come.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) is walking alongside impacted mid councils to bring God's hope and healing to all affected by flooding. Gifts from One Great Hour of Sharing are helping Presbyterian congregations as they reach out to their affected communities to provide emergency provisions like water, food and other supplies to neighbors in need. Members of the PDA National Response Team have been helping with assessments, connecting with long-term recovery groups and serving as a present witness of the larger church during this difficult time. **We will take a special Refugee Offering on Sunday, November 22.**

### TRINITY PARTNERS WITH ICS

In 1985, Interfaith Community Services was formed with the idea that volunteers and congregations of diverse faiths should work together and share resources in better responding to community needs. . While much has changed over the years, the focus at Interfaith Community Services remains consistent. Today, ICS continues to passionately pursue a single mission: "To help Pima County seniors, individuals with disabilities and people in financial crisis achieve stable, healthy and independent lives through programs and services supported by staff, diverse faith communities and the community at large."

ICS works diligently through its network of volunteers to provide financial assistance, job resource centers, a food bank, mobile meals, caregiving services, health advocacy, end of life care and mental health resources. Faith communities have played an important role with

Interfaith Community Services since the organization's inception in 1985. Working side by side with them, ICS is able to do more than any one individual congregation can do. Together ICS and its faith communities provide a strong resource to help those in need with "Love, Cooperation and Service." Over 75% of ICS volunteers come from the network of member faith organizations. Trinity has become a partner of ICS and in doing so we can offer information about them in our Resource Center and help our own members that might need their assistance. ### PAULS' SOCKS



Pauls' Socks, started by the Mission Committee many years ago, was named in honor of Paul Parker and Paul Smith, long time Trinity members. In the beginning, they went to the Swap Meet and bought pairs of socks in bulk. Then they stuffed them with toiletries, hard candy, and other "stocking stuffers" before handing them out to the homeless during the holiday season. Both of these loving, compassionate men spent countless hours annually on this philanthropic project, which eventually bore their names. Trinity has continued this tradition, last year donating 500 Pauls' Socks to Casa Maria. We will also distribute "socks" to Primavera and the Salvation Army. Look for this upcoming service activity and come help stuff some socks.

## RESOURCE CENTER UPDATE

On October 6, I witnessed what the TJDalke Resource Center can do! At around 2 pm my mentor for the day, Joseph Aparicio, entered the RC with two young women who needed services. Joe got online to sign up the homeless 22 year old for health insurance and food stamps. She had been in the state system but her deadline for renewal for these services had expired. She got the renewal and then told us that she had lost her ID. I said, "Come to the Tucson Homeless Connect next Friday and you can get a new ID."

She also needed emergency food. I sent her across the hall for a grocery bag of food from our Food Bank site. She needed a place to stay for the night. I remembered when I toured the new Salvation Army Hospitality House on Main during a WednesdayNiteAlive! program last Spring. I called and they said they would have a bed for her if she showed up before 5pm.

Trinity is blessed to serve God in the heart of the city. The people who came in that day brightened up when I told them to log in to our WiFi with the password: *gacesaves*
