PASTORAL LETTER

Have you ever taken a difficult journey? What made it difficult? Was it the length of time? Was it the conditions under which the journey was taken? Was it those who were also taking the journey, whether acquaintances or strangers? Right before Christmas I drove to Austin to pick up my daughter so she could share the holiday with us. Several weeks ago, I drove her back to Austin, dropped her off, then immediately made the 13-hour drive back. That was a tough journey because of the distance and the little rest that I had from its beginning to its end. But while we were travelling, Patti and I remembered the same journey several years ago under even more difficult conditions (this was before she moved to Austin.)

Patti was scheduled to fly to Austin to catch up with friends for a cruise, but because of the weather her flight was cancelled. I told her I would drive her there, but we had to leave immediately, because her friends were leaving Austin for the ship's port the next morning. That was a genuinely difficult journey, not just because of the time factor, but because of the terrible weather. When I finally returned to Tucson, I was so exhausted that it took me a week to physically recover. In the instance of both journeys with my daughter, it was the physical demands that made the trip difficult. But there are other types of journeys that can be even more tasking.

When I was in my first church in Charlotte, NC, one the kids in our congregation died in a horrible school bus accident. The child had just been confirmed in our church the Sunday before. I will never forget that moment in the hospital when I had to walk with the police officer to a small room in the emergency area to inform the child's parents that their son had died. It was a short journey in distance - about 30 or 40 feet - but it was the hardest journey I have ever made in my life. That year I had to make the same journey two more times for children in my congregation – one who had died from drowning, and another who died from cancer. At the end of that year, I told my wife Amy that I was not sure I had the emotional strength to stay in ministry - but I did.

I am sure you have also made difficult journeys that were physically, mentally, or emotionally taxing, but nothing we have experienced can compare to the journey that Jesus made to the Cross. Lent is a period of 40 days for us to remember Jesus' journey to Golgotha and the price he paid for our salvation. The cost of Christ's journey, from his baptism on the banks of the Jordan River to his final cry upon the Cross, is something we cannot even imagine – but as we read the gospels, we see that the cost of our salvation tasked Jesus in every way – physically, emotionally, and in those final moments of his life, spiritually.

The Lenten season does not ask us to make the same journey as our Lord, but it does ask us to make a journey of remembrance and spiritual discipline. In whatever way we make the journey of Lent, it must be the way that means the most to us. Some Christians surrender something they enjoy for 40 days as a token of the self-deprivation that Jesus embraced. Others take on additional acts of worship in order to remember Christ's journey, including daily devotionals or Scripture reading. I know one person who lights a candle throughout the 40 days when they are home, to watch it slowly be consumed as a remembrance of how Christ's love for us consumed his life. Some disciples make a service or mission commitment for each day of the 40 days, such as gathering food for the Food Bank.

There are many ways to make the journey of Lent, but they are all for one purpose – to bring us spiritually closer to the Lord as we remember God's love for us in the sending of his Son. Whatever difficult journeys we have made in our lives, none can or ever will compare to the via dolorosa that Christ took so that we could know the love of God and receive the promise of eternal life. Let us make the Lenten journey together in our hearts starting on Ash Wednesday, taking just a few moments out of our lives to remember, to express our gratitude, and to commit our hearts to the journey of Christ's church in the world.

- ♦ Session regretfully received the resignation of Will Tilley, Class of 2021 as an active elder.
- Session recombined Finance Committee and Stewardship Committee back to Stewardship & Finance Committee.
- ◆ Janet Hooper and Leone Mohney were elected as Clerk of Session and Treasurer for year 2021. Any "wanna be" clerks out there?
