The Mission Committee's August Special Offering will go to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) which is the emergency & refugee program of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. that enables congregations & mission partners of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A) to witness to the healing love of Christ through caring for communities adversely affected by crisis & catastrophic events. The core budget, including staff and administrative costs, is funded through the One Great Hour of Sharing, & its program work is also funded with designated gifts. PDA's focus is on the long term recovery of disaster impacted communities. It provides training and disaster preparedness for presbyteries and synods. It works collaboratively nationally & internationally with church partners and other faith based responders.

PASTORAL LETTER

Have you ever encountered the term "collective effervescence"? I had never heard that phrase in any context until I read an article last month in the New York Times titled "There's A Specific Type of Joy We've Been Missing." Written by Psychologist and Professor Adam Grant, it focuses on the sudden joy people are feeling as they gather once again for family, community, and national celebrations. The idea of collective effervescence is not new in Psychology. The phrase was coined by sociologist Emile Durkheim at the beginning of the twentieth century as a way of describing "the sense of energy and harmony people feel when come together in a group around a shared purpose."

According to Dr. Grant, ¾ of our population experience collective effervescence at least once a week, while 1/3 of our population experience it every day. Then came the pandemic with its lockdowns, closures, and forced isolation. There were other ways for people to gather, just like we experienced at Trinity through online platforms such as Zoom, but Dr. Grant also points out that "Zoom fatigue" is a proven phenomenon in our culture. Dr. Grant asserts that emotions are contagious, and can be spread not only face-to-face, but online in digital platforms, which would include all of the social network – and most of the shared emotions for the past year have been depression, sadness, and isolation.

The article also notes the sea change that has taken place as our nation begins to emerge from self -isolation. Some of the emotional reactions to our freedom to socialize are extreme, even to the point of being destructive, but many are experiencing nothing more dramatic than the joy of being together once again. In a mission-driven community such as the Christian Church, collective effervescence is not only real, but a gift of the Holy Spirit. In these early weeks of returning to worship in our sanctuary, most of us are just enjoying what we have

missed for well-over a year. Even if we are watching the livestream, it is wonderful to hear liturgical voices joined together in praise of our Lord Jesus Christ.

But it is not just in worship that our collective effervescence is waiting for renewal. As we work together again for the provision and expansion of the mission of Trinity, we will discover something we all have missed – that sense of a collective purpose given to us by Christ. In September the Chancel Choir will return; our post-worship I fellowship and other similar church gatherings will resume. We will be given opportunities to expand our caring missions for our community, and we will engage our minds in response to Christ's important call for us to "learn from him" through our educational programs. We will once again hear the effervescence of children on our church grounds, and the harmony of beautiful music so wonderfully provided by Lynn and Bruce.

Isn't it time for us to share the contagious joy of our Lord once again? Dr. Grant draws several conclusions in his article, but one resonated with me as a Christian and a member of a faith community: "Some of us have already started feeling the thrill of creative collisions at work or the rush of a real vacation. But getting out of the house doesn't guarantee that we'll pursue happiness the best way." I will add one idea to his words – "but getting into God's house will." As we continue to re-engage in our congregational life, let us remember that this means more than worship, church school, mission work, or fellowship – it means all these things with a spiritual commitment to our task as disciples. Our collective effervescence always includes the presence of Christ, and there can be no greater happiness for believers. Please have a wonderful and safe August, and I will see you at church or online.

Educating Homeless Teens... Investing in Arizona's Future!

Each year 40% of the **Pentecost offering** goes to local youth at risk. Trinity's Mission Committee made the decision that this year's offering would go to Youth on Their Own. Youth On Their Own (YOTO) is a dropout prevention program that supports the high school graduation & continued success of homeless youth in Pima County. The organization was founded in 1986 when Ann Young, a guidance counselor in the Amphitheater School District, noticed that talented and motivated students were dropping out of school due to homelessness and being forced to live on their own without a parent or guardian. Inspired by the students' tenacity and willingness to stay in school, other school counselors, teachers, volunteers, and community members came together to form YOTO with the goal of helping students graduate. A check for \$1172 has been sent from Trinity to YOTO! Thank you for your generosity!

SESSION NOTES

Still Zooming along Session met to conduct regular business. Session traditionally does not meet in July for a stated meeting. If anything comes up that needs attention Session will conduct a Called meeting either by Zoom or electronically. During the Leading Together segment of the June meeting the subject centered around evaluating the first Sunday – June 13th – for in-person worship or hybrid worship. Comments were positive and some tweaks are planned. Sixty persons and several children attended in the sanctuary while 45 used various platforms on the web to attend. Changes to mask protocols will be staged throughout the summer. Rally Day on September 12th is the target date to open completely for Fellowship and Sunday School. Meanwhile committees will decide to continue meeting via Zoom or in person for September and beyond. Good job, everyone!

- Session conducted Corporation business by approving a Trinity PC Corporate Resolution that allows the church Treasurer Leone Mohney, the Clerk Janet Hooper, the Administration & Personnel Chair Liz Strong and the Stewardship & Finance Chair Jeanette Ryan to conduct the financial business of the church.
- The report from the Treasurer Leone Mohney shows a continued deficit for Trinity. Those who are vacationing during the summer are encouraged to keep up with their pledged giving.
- Dr. Mack loves having a sanctuary with people singing and clapping and talking and is forward thinking about the future.
- Deacons are preparing for ushers in September and are anxious to meet in person again.
- Trinity Presbyterian Women are busy making Ryan's Bears, planning for a new Bible Study in September, and preparing to attend a national meeting via Zoom in August.
- Session approved upon the recommendation of the Administration & Personnel Committee the fully updated Trinity PC Personnel Policies as of June 2021. The improved policies represent a lot of work and revision on the part of this committee. Kudos for a job well done.
- Christian Education is sad that Matt Kreamer is stepping down as a youth teacher, but glad that

- Bonnie Stull and Debbie Hobbs are considering a team teaching gig.
- Mission Committee continues to serve our community with the Resource Center, the Food Bank and sandwich making. Forty per cent of the Pentecost Offering will serve young people in Tucson. Mission will decide which organization will receive that 40%.
- Property Committee is thankful for the generous gifts to the Property Wish List and continues to make repairs as needed.
- Stewardship & Finance is undertaking the complicated transfer of Trinity investment funds to the New Covenant Trust plus is looking ahead to develop a stewardship plan.
- Worship Committee is working on the production of "wine bread" which is a safe way to deliver communion to the congregation. Wait for it! It will be a surprise. Also, they are discussing protocols for guest music groups and perhaps changing out the choir pews for chairs.
- Session prayed for congregants in need of special care and concern especially Elder Barbara Callaway Pollack recovering from her severe arm break.
