PASTORAL LETTER

As we approach the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ, I would like to take a moment to make the distinction between Easter "joy" and Easter "happiness." In our culture, sometimes the word "happiness" is confused with the word "joy." If we think about the celebration of Easter from a "holiday" point of view, there are many ways that we seek to make our celebration a happy event. Children will color eggs and receive Easter baskets. We will see images of the Easter bunny, (and share some chocolate ones) while many families and adults will travel to their favorite vacation spot for the Easter holiday. While Easter is, thankfully, not as secularized as Christmas, our culture will still seek to drain every bit of "happiness" that it can from the celebration. But if we, as believers in Jesus Christ, carefully read and open our hearts to the Easter story, we will discover that Easter is about joy, and joy requires a different journey, a journey quite different from the one to happiness. On that Sunday morning following the crucifixion of Christ, the mood among the apostles and the disciples was anything but happy.

Can you imagine the emotional state of the women as they journeyed to the tomb to anoint Jesus' body, as required by the Jewish tradition? When they arrived at the tomb, now open, and heard from the angel the good news of Christ's resurrection, the gospel of Matthew states that they left the tomb quickly filled with "fear and joy." Isn't that an interesting combination of emotions? Would we ever join the emotion of fear with emotion of happiness? They are polar opposites. So how can joy and fear be experienced by the same heart? Christ had told His followers that He would return to them from the tomb. I'm sure the women did not allow themselves to even grasp that hope until they ran from the gravesite. Joy and hope are inextricably linked. The fear mentioned in the story was from experiencing something that

no human had ever experienced - not the resurrection, but what the resurrection affirmed - that Jesus Christ was truly the promised Messiah.

Until that Sunday, most of Christ's followers probably experienced hopelessness and despair. No one had ever returned from death, and though Jesus had made this promise, it was one beyond human comprehension. But from the astonishing news from the angel to the women to the other disciples, hope grew in the hearts of those who believed in Jesus, and from that hope grew a deep and profound joy. From that morning on, the apostles and the disciples would face many unhappy days. Christ's followers would be persecuted by their culture, isolated by their families, and rejected by many who were insulted or infuriated by their story and their faith. Even among themselves the followers of Christ would experience unhappiness, as we read in many of Paul's letters to the church.

But for 2000 years, Christians have had a source of joy that overwhelms the ordinary ups and downs of life. Our joy is our faith in the resurrection of Christ and the promise that we will join Christ in the resurrected kingdom. When all else in this world fails, we can go to the Word of God and discover the joy that transcends this mortal life - a joy that makes this mortal life sweeter and more meaningful. If we celebrate Easter from our faith in Jesus Christ as the Son of God, we will experience the deep and eternal joy from knowing that Christ is always with us and, when our purpose on earth is complete, we will be always with Christ. What deeper joy can there be, ever? Have a joyful Easter!

SESSION NOTES

Using Zoom once again, Session met this month and were delighted to interview Rose Emery and Al Coffin as prospective new members at Trinity. It seems a lot of us may have thought they were already members, but both belonged to other churches where they have lived during the summer months. Rose was a member years ago before moving away from Tucson. Anyway, both are transferring from their former churches to join our Trinity family. They will be introduced to the congregation in a few weeks. We welcome them with open arms and are delighted with their participation in our body of faith. Following are the communications and actions from the stated Session meeting in March:

- Our Deacons will help with the parking lots for the spring 4th Avenue Street Fair.
- The Long Range Development Team reported that our Paulos, Dorman & Bourn Development Group have leased the top two floors of the Phase I building and are actively seeking bids to build Phase II. They have asked for another extension on their contract with Trinity for Phase II as bids are slow to materialize from sub-contractors that are extra busy right now with projects delayed by the pandemic and shortages of materials in the supply lines.
- Session voted to accept the Developers proposal of \$75,000 earnest money and \$25,000 non-earnest money, all of which is non-refundable for a one-year extension on the closing of Phase II – subject to our attorney reviewing the documentation. It is possible that the closing for the old Educational Wing may happen before the end of that year extension.
- Session approved Christian Education Committee's request to use some of or all of the budget line 37300 "Triennium Scholarship Fund" currently at \$4,350.36 for Trinity youth scholarships to either Montlure camp to be held near Flagstaff in 2022 or to a possible local Arizona youth gathering elsewhere (mini-Triennium). The 2022 national Triennium gathering has been cancelled.
- Growth & Outreach Team shared plans for Trinity to have posters and tables at the 4th Avenue Street Fair that will highlight our mission activities and other aspects of life at Trinity.
- Mission Committee reported serving 88 people at the Resource Center in February. Food Bank served 232 people and helped 745 walk-in people with snacks. Also, in February, 775 sandwiches were made for Casa Maria. Volunteers are appreciated with these mission activities.
- Session approved Property Committee's recommendation to place video surveillance signs and "Private Property" sign at various areas around our campus to help deter vandalism. Our insurance company likes this idea.
- Stewardship & Finance asked Session to approve an updated Corporate Resolution that allows the Treasurer, Leone Mohny; the Clerk of Session, Janet Hooper; the Administration & Personnel Chair, Liz Strong; and the Stewardship & Finance Chair, Ruth Russell to manage the finances of Trinity Presbyterian Church as of March 22, 2022. This update happens on a regular basis as needed.
- Worship Committee reports that we will return to a more "normal" way to serve communion. Say goodbye to the "wine bread."
- Worship Committee has also decided to feature a prayer vigil time in the Chapel after worship services from 11:45 to 1:00 after worship services to pray for the people of Ukraine or other issues.

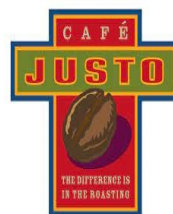
RESOURCE CENTER
