PASTORAL LETTER

One of my favorite hymns from my southern Presbyterian heritage is "Have Thine Own Way, Lord." The opening line of the hymn is "Have thine own way, Lord, have thine own way. Thou art the potter, I am the clay. Mold me and make me after thy will, while I am waiting, yielded and still." The scriptural reference for that beautiful stanza is found in Jeremiah 18: "Just like the clay in the potter's hand, so are you in my hand, O house of Israel."

In this passage, Jeremiah envisions a shapeless lump of clay, without form, meaning, or purpose, but with great potential. The potter begins to spin the wheel and mold the clay into a new creation. God is the potter of Jeremiah's vision, and God's people are the clay, a people who exist for God's own creative purposes. Jeremiah presents a deeply spiritual image of how the people of God, then and now, are to view the meaning of life and our place in it.

While Christ doesn't use this image in his own teaching, he constantly speaks of the creative spirit that will come after his death and resurrection, and how that spirit will shape our lives to fit the Lord's ultimate purpose: "I have said these things to you while I am still with you. But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you." (John 14: 25-26)

If we are to affirm our faith in God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, then we must also affirm that God is the potter, and we are the clay. Anyone who has watched potters perform their art knows that the creation of a vessel is a turbulent process involving spinning, shaping, and baking. Committing one's life to Christ demands that we open ourselves to God's creative spirit, and in doing so we will feel spun, shaped, and put under the heat of life's turmoil and temptations.

The Christian conscience does not allow us to embrace a convenient faith empowered by cheap grace. If we allow Christ to shape our lives, we must change the way we see ourselves and those around us. In changing our view of our place and purpose in the world, we then must act as God calls us to act. We cannot sit still in the face of suffering, intolerance, and injustice. We also cannot rationalize our sinfulness. Rather, we must feel the pain of our wrongdoing, so that we can experience the joy of forgiveness. In addition, the spirit will not allow us to be occasional in our commitment or seasonal in our worship. A commitment to Christ's church places upon us an obligation to join our spiritual and material gifts with our sister and brother Christians in furthering the Kingdom of God in this world.

Do we put God into our hands as we feel the need, or do we place ourselves into God's hand as God needs us? To place God into our hands is idolatry – it is to make God into an object that exists for our purposes and at our convenience. Christ made it clear that those who would be his disciples must humble their hearts and place themselves wholly into God's hands. God is the potter – we are the clay, and there can be no other way.

It is not easy to surrender so much of one's self in a world that thrives on selfishness, but everything made of the world eventually falls into decay and obsolescence. It is God alone, through the love of Christ and the presence of the Spirit, who can make us new each day, each hour, each heartbeat and beyond. Are we on the potter's wheel? It is easy to get there – all we need do is ask for God to use us as his clay and make something of us for his glory. May God's work in this world begin in us today, right now, and forever.

But we only see and enjoy the polished performances and have little idea about the amount of preparation required for those performances. The time and thought that Bruce spends to enhance our worship experience is astounding as he manages the choir members, the section leader interns, the orchestra, the individual instrumentalists, the anthems, the music budget and more. Trinity PC is so blessed to have Bruce on staff as our Choir Director. Following are the communications from busy committees:

- ◆ The Deacons have scheduled the All-Church Picnic for November 2nd. The deacons also monitor members of our Trinity family and give them care and understanding.
- ◆ Trinity Presbyterian Women will soon finish their Bible study and are working hard on Ryan's Bears for 2024.
- Administration & Personnel Committee is conducting bookkeeper interviews soon to replace Gerry Pearson who is retiring in April.
- Christian Education will host Bill Brown on April 7th as he speaks about "The Book of Job and Extreme Biology 101" after worship in Fellowship Hall. They also made plans for the Easter Brunch, the Egg Hunt and Easter story for our young members.
- Mission Committee is giving a \$500 gift to the Young Adult Volunteers and allowing Mata Ortiz pottery people from Frontera de Cristo as vendors on our church property during the spring 4th Avenue Street Fair.
- Property Committee has arranged for the final duct work to be completed for the Trinity Hall air handler in time for the Rose Show. They are also researching how to make the ramp at the east entrance safer for everyone.

- Stewardship & Finance Committee is reviewing our insurance carrier and working to maintain a good cash flow while managing deficit expenditures.
- Worship Committee finalized plans for Easter worship. They also received a report from Lynn Moser about the progress made by the Organ Committee as they hear presentations from different companies about how to repair/replace/restore our organ console and its many pipes.
- Dr. Mack and Tom Roof are researching ways and organizations that can help us do some strategic planning for the future.
- ◆ The elders are thankful for servant leaders and all the ways we can be serving God in the heart of our city as Tucson faces a migrant crisis and a homeless crisis.


