PASTORAL LETTER

Summer in Pima County brings with it both pleasures and worries. Since the University and the local schools are on summer break, the traffic in our community is a little bit easier to handle. On the other hand, there are more children out and about in our neighborhoods, and we are all aware of the pedestrian hazards in Tucson. In the wake of spring, some of the most beautiful flora and fauna abound in the summer in the parks and the trails, but to hike or just to walk these areas can be extremely hazardous in the heat. I found this out the hard way just by sitting outside during midsummer to enjoy our yard. I was not wearing a hat, but I thought that, planning only to be out for a short time, it would not matter. But when you have from Type 2 diabetes, you are extremely susceptible to the effects of dehydration. When I got up to go back in, suddenly I found myself barely able to walk, and I couldn't speak correctly. It would have appeared to Amy as if I were totally drunk, but she knew right away what was happening. She called the hospital to see if I needed to go in for rehydration, but as I drank more water and took my glucose tablets, I quickly started to feel better. Every summer we hear of healthy individuals dying on the trails and parks of the area because they are not aware that they are perspiring just as they would in the more humid regions of the world. Summer is also a great time to see the natural wonders of Arizona, such as the Grand Canyon (which is unlike anything on the planet.) But many people from all over the world have the same idea, making these trips unbearably crowded. When I lived in Florida, we had a year-round pass to Disneyworld. It was great fun, but we also had to plan our visits very carefully, picking the days and the hours when the parks would be less crowded.

Even our Christianity is impacted by the pleasures and challenges of summer. On the pleasure side, we find additional time to do things indoors that are safer, including reading. But practicing our faith can be impacted by our perception that, because of the season, there is less to do for

others in the name of Christ; nothing could be further from the truth. Homelessness, hunger, illness, death, and migrant issues do not take a summer break. Our gifts are needed just as much in the next few months, if not more, because of summer's hazards and the lack of more hands to help mitigate those hazards. I want to challenge you in the months ahead to make a prayerful commitment to do several things. First, read something about our faith, either in the Bible or in a book. Our church library is filled with some amazing publications, and I am happy to recommend them to you on any subject in which you are interested. Second, if you do not have one already, set a regular time and place for prayer. Third, contribute to our Food Bank or some other benevolent need which interests you. Right now, the Food Bank is stocked with water, but by midsummer we will be asking for more, and we always need high-protein canned food. Fourth, if you are unable to attend Trinity worship services in person, take advantage of our streaming services. Sheila has put together one of the best worship streams that I have ever seen. Unlike many other churches, she has done this, and is producing the service, by herself. We always appreciate your feedback as you watch our service online, so please let us know if there are any issues. Finally, since we are more distanced from each other as a congregation, let us continue to lift each other up to God. We need not do so by name. God knows our names. But we need to pray for our congregation & for Trinity Presbyterian Church.

It is my prayer that you and your loved ones will have a wonderful, safe, and restful summer. God bless you and keep you in the love of Christ.

Trinity's Food Pantry is open Tuesday and Thursday from 12:00 to 3:00 pm in basement of the Sanctuary building.



SESSION NOTES

This month Session did not have a great deal of business to conduct so our meeting was quick and easy. During our Leading Together time we had the great pleasure of welcoming Sheila Croteau, Trinity's Administrative Assistant and Office Manager. We knew Sheila is very busy and organized, but all of us are in awe of the number of tasks she accomplishes in a 30-hour work week. You name it; Sheila does it! She monitors the phone, email, snail mail, members who need some information, visitors and the homeless that come to the office door. She produces the Sunday bulletins and the monthly VISION. She organizes the slides for the Sunday streaming service. She services the church web site, computers, printers, copier, the wireless network, the security system and works with our remote bookkeeper. The biggest challenge for her is that being a Jill of all trades, there is no one to back her up and it would be a good guess that it would take more than one person to fill her shoes. There is only one office volunteer – Cindy Toering to help with some of the tasks. We are so blessed that Sheila joined the Trinity staff in 2016. Give her a big thank you! And maybe consider volunteering in the office for a few hours.

Here are the business items accomplished by Session and its committees this month:

- Session approved updating the Memorial Garden and Columbarium Regulations to allow Session to approve the eligibility of non-members and their family members to use the columbarium because we no longer have a Memorial Garden Committee to make those decisions.
- Session then approved Certificates of Purchase for the Memorial Garden Columbarium for two non-members.
- Session approved a baptism for Christopher Kittle Roberts for June 30, 2024.
- Session approved Nancy Hamadou to be a member-at-large for the Stewardship & Finance Committee.
- Session received the information that Mack officiated at a wedding in the Trinity Chapel on May 15th for Mark Phillip Moore and Patricia De La Rosa.

- Administration & Personnel Committee has completed staff reviews and is planning a small luncheon in Tubac to celebrate Gerry Pearson, our former bookkeeper.
- Mission Committee says that Trinity's portion of the One Great Hour of Sharing special offering will go to I Am You 360, a non-profit that serves foster people who have aged out of the system.
- Property Committee continues to work out how to make the ramp at the east entrance to the church a safer ramp without a curb. Also, this committee wants input for how we can use the Trinity Hall kitchen in the future.
- Session does not meet in July unless there is an emergency need.
- Session prayed for congregants who are traveling, for Elliott Koeppen, for Carolyn Maycher, for the John Lamse family and for our Trinity church serving God in the heart of the city.

TRINITY PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

Trinity Presbyterian Women participate in three different funds of Presbyterian Women nationally. The Fellowship of the Least Coin was described in the May issue of the VISION. Another fund is the Birthday Offering. This offering gives women a tangible way to celebrate the blessings in their lives. The fund gives to five projects each year, in amounts of \$75,000 to \$150,000. The fund was begun in in 1922 and has been shared every year despite conflicts in the world. Projects on six continents have been recipients for over 100 years. Those receiving grants in 2023 include Making Miracles Group Home, Tallahassee Fla; Advocate for Community Choice Bethel Hills-Villa Apts, Marthaville, Mo; Western College Bethel Synod Birhame Yesus Kindergarten School Construction Dembi-Dollo, Ethiopa. In 2024 Presbyterian Church Café Ginko, Louisville KY was a recipient.
