PASTORAL LETTER

As soon as the month of October ends, most of the nation will go off of Daylight Savings Time, (DST) except for Arizona, Hawaii, and five US territories. Arizona opted out of DST in 1968 due to its hot desert climate, arguing that an extra hour of late-day sun would increase energy use for air conditioning rather than save it (or it could have just been stubbornness). So where did Daylight Savings Time originate? DST was originally proposed by Benjamin Franklin after a visit to Paris in the 1780's. Europe experimented with DST in the 18th and 19th centuries, but it was Great Britain who first put into effect a nationalized DST law in 1906.

America's first experiment with DST was during World War I, as a means of extending the workday for manufacturers of war materials. President Woodrow Wilson tried to make DST a national standard but was defeated in those efforts by the Congress. During World War II, DST was in effect year-round, from 1942 until the end of the war, after which states were given the option whether they wished to legislate it. It wasn't until 1996 that Congress passed a law mandating DST for all 50 states. The one exception was states that had more than one time zone within its borders.

Now that you know just about everything there is to know about DST, so what? Well, to me Daylight Savings Time represents how precious time is to us, and how much we want to make the most of the time in this life that we are given. DST is either a wonderful convenience for some or a hassle for others (I always felt the latter), but either way it proves that time is not static. Time can be manipulated; time is flexible. What we make out of the time we are given in life is what we choose to make of it.

For we who follow Christ, the choice of how we use our time was defined for us by the one we worship and follow. From the very beginning of his ministry, Jesus talked about time from a new perspective. Until Christ, humanity measured a lifetime from birth to death, but Jesus presented a concept of time related to God.

According to Christ, his followers were part of a new way of life – a life transcendent.

Rather than thinking in terms of birth, death, and whatever might come after death – like much of the world in Christ's day – Jesus presented a new way of

understanding time: birth, re-birth, and life eternal. Humanity's rebirth began with Christ's resurrection and our belief in that singular event. Until the resurrection, our only option in life for peace, security, or joy was that provided by worldly things – the lucky had them; the unfortunate did not. To have a happy life, one had to gain all the things that one could; but with Christ's resurrection, the object of life was redefined – pleasing God became the ultimate goal of living, as opposed to pleasing ourselves.

While this new perspective may sound simple, its effect upon our understanding of life was, and still is, phenomenal. In pre-Christian religion, the gods favor could only be measured by the worldly gains one accumulated; after Christ, the suffering and sadness of life was given ultimate meaning. The poor, the sick, the wounded and despairing no longer needed to view themselves or be viewed by others as out of favor with the gods or the one God. As the Apostle Paul writes, "I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us."

What does this new view of time mean for us? Since eternal life removes all quantitative approaches to time, we measure our lives not by years, but by Spirit. The Holy Spirit makes every moment of life meaningful, no matter how many moments we are given to live. While death still thrusts heartache and grief upon us, it is a temporary condition. Death does not have the final say. As for making the most of our time in this life, that is achieved not through the values of the world, but through the divine values taught to us by the Son of God – values that are animated in our hearts through the Holy Spirit. When we take time, and make time for worship, mission, love, prayer, confession and forgiveness, we have made the most of our time, no matter how the day has been.

The time of our lives – is it driven by the world's temporary definitions of happiness, or is it defined by the Christ we show to the world in every moment? Some parts of our nation have Daylight Savings Time, but every Christian in the world has a time that never ends. Our mission is to invite the world to join in God's time, God's love, and that ever-present joy which exceeds all happiness.

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

WHO'S IN YOUR PEW Meet Betty Allen

What did you do for a living? I taught general music for 30 years, & taught voice at Pima College & the University of Arizona. I sang opera & maintained a private voice studio.



Where is your hometown? I have lived in Tucson since 1952, when my parents, Ed and Marian Wald, moved here with myself and my two sisters. I lived here all my life, raised five children (his, mine, and ours).

What do you like to do in your leisure time? I sing in choir, & have been playing viola in the Civic Orchestra of Tucson for the past few years. I picked up playing fiddle a few years ago and have been learning American Old Time fiddle tunes. Ron and I like to sit on the back porch at our summer home in Ruidoso and play our fiddles. We keep up with our five grown children and six grandchildren, scattered from Tucson to NYC to Sweden.

What is your favorite food? I'm not picky, but I really love home-grown Wagyu beef. I also like rice pudding and key lime pie. Oh, and lots of veggies and salads.

What is your favorite Hymn and Bible verse? I have so many favorite hymns, usually the one I'm singing at the time. Today it's "My Shepherd Will Supply my Need". My favorite Bible verse is Psalm 100.

What does this church mean to you? From the time I first stepped into this church at age 3, it has meant security of a supportive and loving community, and the knowledge of a constant and loving God. My parents, Ed and Marian Wald, took us to Trinity the first Sunday we were here in 1952. When my Dad was in a bad car accident the following morning, Dr. McGee saw the article in the paper and immediately called Mom, offering help for the next several months. We became members, and attended every Sunday morning, evening, and Wednesday night suppers. I sang in every choir, from Cherubs through the 100-strong high school choir. Today, in my 70's, it carries the same meaning with the added comfort of coming home to many friends who have been part of my life and my parents' lives. In addition, Trinity's tradition of quality church music, service to the community, thoughtful and meaningful sermons, and the closeness of a smaller but dedicated congregation means a lot to me.

What is one thing people don't know about you? I enjoy researching my ancestry, and I discovered I'm the umpteenth great granddaughter of a 16th century Norwegian pirate. There's even an opera written about him!

WHO'S IN YOUR PEW Meet Ron Allen

What did you do for a living? I was a professor at the University of Arizona in the departments of Animal Sciences and Nutritional Sciences.

Where is your hometown? Abilene, Texas is where I grew up, and after nine years in Iowa and Michigan, I moved to Tucson where I've lived for the past 45 years.

What do you like to do in your leisure time? I raise thoroughbred race horses, and love to see them at the farm and watch them run. I enjoy working with wood, primarily mesquite, creating unique and functional pieces. I started playing fiddle after I retired, and Betty and I enjoy jamming and attending fiddle contests and festivals together. I really like singing in the choir here at Trinity.

What is your favorite food? Beef steak. What is your favorite Hymn or Bible verse? "Be Thou My Vision" is my favorite hymn, and Psalm 139 is my favorite Bible verse.

What does this church mean to you? My family has been Presbyterian since the 1600's, and I enjoy being a member of a traditional Presbyterian church. Like Betty, the first Sunday I was in Tucson in 1981, I attended Trinity and soon afterward became a member. As a single parent, one child being disabled, this church embraced me and my children. Members like Paul and Jane Parker and others made us feel at home (even the Young Couples group invited me and my children to some of their events). Volunteering at the Food Pantry Monday from 9:30 am to 11:30 am


