

# PASTORAL LETTER

***“Truly I tell you, if you have faith and do not doubt, even if you say to this mountain, “Be lifted up and thrown into the sea,” it will be done. Whatever you ask for in prayer with faith, you will receive.”***

*Matthew 21: 21-22*

I grew up in Charlotte, which was located almost directly between the beaches of South Carolina and the mountains of North Carolina. In our North Carolina churches, there has been a running joke for many years in response to the typical church question, “How is attendance?” The answer: “It’s up and down – up at the mountains and down at the beaches!”

In the gospels we see Jesus preaching, teaching, and healing in both venues – by the sea of Galilee, or in the mountains of the Judean hill country. So much of Jesus’ teaching reflects the scene of where the teaching takes place, and in the verses above from the gospel of Matthew, Jesus has a mountain in view – probably the temple mount – as He teaches this lesson on faith. Verses 21-22 are two of the most misunderstood and abused passages in all of Christianity, used by unscrupulous preachers and religious charlatans to pile guilt on believers who earnestly seek an answer to prayer. We have seen and heard these false prophets say to their suffering congregations, “You did not have enough faith – that is why your prayers were not answered.” But is that the point of Christ’s lesson?

First, let’s remember that Christ taught us how to pray, and that prayer is very simple: “Our Father, who art in heaven....”. Every aspect of the Lord’s prayer, every petition, can be prayed fervently, with faith, and with a full expectation of an answer: “Thy kingdom come...Thy will be done...forgive us our sins...deliver us from evil...”. Second, and even more importantly, Christ is not telling us that the purpose of prayer is to move mountains in a literal sense. Why would we even pray for such a thing? There is no reason in heaven or on earth to pray that a mountain jump into the sea. Faith is not a characteristic in which the sole purpose is to demonstrate supernatural power. However, faith is the only characteristic in life that can connect us to the spiritual power and presence of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

Jesus never once made a mountain jump into a sea, but He did still the storm so that His followers would not be afraid; He did love, teach, forgive, and heal those who came to the seashores and the mountains to hear Him. Our faith in Jesus Christ can do the same things in our lives and in the lives of others – it can heal broken hearts, forgive long-held grievances, set aside old wounds and regrets, teach those around us about the love of God, and teach us how to love each other unconditionally. Those are the mountains in our own lives that only Jesus can move. Regarding answering all of our prayers, Jesus never presents prayer as a shopping list of personal desires. Prayer is not meant to give us a check-off list of the things God has given us as opposed to the things God has denied us. Rather, prayer is like holding hands with God – the feeling and the Presence of the Holy Spirit are far more important than the words.

Prayer is not about moving dirt – it is about the love between us and our Creator, who knows what we need. That love moves our hearts every day into undiscovered places of hope and comfort, places where we need not fear anything that life throws at us. Prayer is not a demand – it is an act of faith. Christ prays with us and for us to the Father, and the Father, who loves us, moves the mountains that keep us from seeing Him. Have you let God move the mountains from in front of you so that you can see God’s love? That is the true prayer that Jesus taught us to pray.

# MISSION NEWS

The Mission Committee is designating the Sister Jose Women's Center (located at 1050 S. Park Avenue) as the organization to receive the February Mission special offering. This offering will be collected on Sunday, February 22nd in person and can be made online through the month of February into mid-March. Information from the Sister Jose website is as follows: "Sister Jose Women's Center is a Tucson-based 501c3 organization that exists to aid and transform the lives of women who are un-housed. Their low-barrier day center provides unaccompanied women who are unhoused with a stable and safe environment to recuperate from the daily struggle of homelessness and extreme poverty." The center was "built on the teachings and compassion of Sister Jose Hobday, a Franciscan nun who dedicated her life to helping the poor...Sister Jose believed that we should "live life with hands and hearts open, sharing, and serving others." The Sister Jose Women's Center is a "low-barrier" shelter which means any woman who is unhoused is welcomed with open arms. Center Services include MEALS (3 meals a day, 6 days a week), LAUNDRY (Guests can clean their clothes & personal belongings), CLOTHING (donated clothing plus new underwear). SAFE SPACES (guests are met where they are & their beloved pets are included: and "All are treated with the respect and dignity they deserve.") # MISSION NEWS

Trinity's mission committee started off the year with the open house for the food pantry. The number of households in January '26 is today twice the number served in January '25. Despite the cuts to national funding, local donations attempt to fill the void. Shortages come and go. Presently there is a bread shortage nationally,

Trinity receives groceries from Walmart every Monday. A crew of 11-13 volunteers pick up, sort through and store 800-1500 lbs. of food/nonfood. On February 2, 13 volunteers attended the annual mandatory civil rights training and signed their client confidentiality notices. Several who hand out groceries to the public will be taking the Health Department's Food Handling Course. That is another requirement for us to stay open. On February 3 we got a surprise visit by our Community Food Bank liaison. Brianna Encinas inspected and cleared us for another year of service and in May we hope to pass the Health Department's yearly inspection.

Christ Presbyterian Church has reserved 226 seats at the Gaslight Theater on Broadway/Kolb on April 19th at 6pm for the showing of "009 License to Thrill". This is a fundraiser for the Presbytery de Cristo Mission. Tickets are \$33. Checks are to be made out to Trinity. Billie will be selling the tickets. The deadline for buying your ticket is March 15th. After that, unsold tickets go to the Gaslight Box office to sell to the public. The Gaslight is always fun for me!! More information is below on this.

The Fourth Ave Street Fair is March 20-22. The Cup of Water signup sheet will be available March 1. This is a tremendous exposure for our church. The deacons will be selling parking lot spaces at this Street Fair.

On Ash Wednesday, February 18, Kathy had us make Grab and Go bags for handing out to people in need in the community. The bags will be in the narthex if you'd like have one to hand out in this Lenten Season.

# TRINITY WOMEN



# JANUARY SESSION NOTES

Well, here we go! Session had its first meeting of the new year. This meeting is always a house-keeping meeting. That means Session voted to establish officers, new committee assignments and other routine business. Here are the highlights:

- ◆ Session elected Eileen Lamse as Treasurer and Janet Hooper as Clerk of Session.
- ◆ John Hill and Carolyn Maycher were elected to serve as Trinity's Presbytery Commissioners. We are now allowed three commissioners. Church members are eligible to be a commissioner and don't have to be an active serving elder. Anyone interested?
- ◆ The following committee assignments were approved: Administration & Personnel Chair Roberta Westergaard with Dave Toering and Liz Strong; Christian Education Chair John Hill; Mission Chair Cheyenne Williams with Koffi Seddo; Property Chair Tom Roof; Stewardship & Finance Chair Ruth Russell with Eileen Lamse; Worship Chair Janet Jones with Janet Hooper.
- ◆ Session approved each committee's Members-at-Large. Each committee chair is always looking for volunteers to help with committee work. Congregants can ask to serve, and Session can approve their assignment.
- ◆ The annual Church Statistical Report for 2025 was submitted to General Assembly with Session's approval. At the end of 2025 Trinity had an active membership of 152 congregants.
- ◆ For 4<sup>th</sup> Avenue Street Fairs, the Deacons will be allowed to resume charging and monitoring the parking around the church. They are also discussing their role in discharging the newly created Senior Relief Emergency Fund.
- ◆ Administration & Personnel informed Session of the 2026 Pastor's Terms of Call that will be presented to the congregation for approval at the February 8<sup>th</sup> Annual Congregational Meeting.
- ◆ Remember Terry Dalke? Mission Committee reports receiving \$19,662.19 from her sister Deborah and husband Duane Campbell for specified mission accounts after the sale of some stock.
- ◆ Property Committee continues work on an updated Facilities Use Form along with rate

charges for outside groups to use space in our church.

- ◆ Stewardship & Finance reported receiving 47 pledges for 2026.
- ◆ Worship Committee is planning Lenten activities.
- ◆ Session is planning to meet with a representative from an organization known as Sacred Spaces to learn how they might help us with sanctuary improvements and organ repairs.
- ◆ Session thanked Karen Wilkison as she "retires" from Session and prayed for new possibilities and hope for 2026.


