PASTORAL LETTER



We probably have already made plans for the New Year. Perhaps we have established some travel dates and made a commitment to those dates by reserving or purchasing tickets. Perhaps our plans for the year involve a long-awaited project that we are determined to finally complete. We may choose to get an elective medical procedure that we have been putting off for a long time. A new year is when we think about and make plans, with an expectation that we will be able to fulfill them.

But life doesn't work that way, does it? Of the plans that we make at the beginning of each year, how many do we complete? The issue, of course, is that life is surprising, and every day brings the unexpected. We receive a communication – a family member, a physician, a mechanic – and our plans change. We turn on a switch and nothing happens; we take a wrong step and have a fall; a pet becomes ill; a trauma occurs; we catch a virus – and this is naming just a few of the things that can happen to us over the year.

The problem is that while we desire to live for the future, the present keeps imposing itself upon our lives. In the gospel, the same problem is why so many had a difficult time accepting Jesus of Nazareth as the Messiah. For years Israel's religion had formulated a set of plans involving the arrival of the one promised by the prophets. Though prophets like Isaiah pointed to a Savior who would come to suffer and sacrifice for the sake of creation, that was not an attractive vision of the future for Israel, who remembered the glory and power of King David.

In remembering the power and glory of the Davidic kingdom, the religious leaders of Israel set the prophets aside and created a Messiah in an image that they desired. After many centuries, the religious leaders were so committed to the future of the Messiah which they had envisioned, that they could not envision any other possibility.

When Jesus of Nazareth emerged from an obscure region of Galilee, it required a daily commitment by those around him to see that he was the Messiah in every way that the prophets had foreseen. Following Jesus daily was not an easy task. Jesus said and did controversial things that ran counter to the religious traditions and practices of the people. We read in John that by the time Jesus neared Jerusalem for his final Passover, only a few of those who regularly followed him remained – a small group which including the original twelve apostles whom he had called. Those who remained stayed because, though they had been steeped in a religious Messianic vision, they could not deny the reality of what they experienced in Christ as they lived with him day-to-day. The climax of their resolve is when Jesus asked a question of the remaining disciples before he made his final journey to the cross - "Do you also wish to leave?" To which Peter poignantly replied, "Lord, to whom shall we go?"

Whatever may happen to us in the coming year – however our plans may come to fruition or remain unfulfilled, we have someone to go to everyday. What do the plans for our present lives matter, when God has a plan for our eternal lives? Why would we commit to anything else? The question is still the same for the coming year as it has been in every previous year of our lives – to whom shall we go? There is no love like God's love, and no joy that compares to the daily presence of our Lord in our lives. It is going to be a wonderful year, because we have a wonderful Savior.

SESSION NOTES

Last meeting of 2022! We reluctantly say so long to Ruth Russell and Liz Strong as they become "resting" elders. Both have chaired essential committees – Stewardship & Finance and Administration & Personnel – with expertise and wise counsel. Luckily, they will remain on those committees as members-at-large to continue the good work these committees do for Trinity. In the New Year we will welcome two new members to the Session – Allen Coffin and Tom Roof. Before we Zoom into 2023 here are the highlights of the December meeting:

- Dr. Mack briefed Session members about the state of our church. He emphasized how we have become a hybrid church now welcoming people into our sanctuary but maintaining an online presence. Our technology has improved, but our sound system needs some tweaking. Our property is sold and we will have some adjustments as the Developers begin building. Trinity Hall should be up and running by the end of the first quarter. Adaptation is a key word here and our staff is commended for helping needed changes happen. Session committees all operate well with good leadership. The state of Trinity is good as we institute our future plans.
- The committees are summarizing their 2022 accomplishments for Sheila Croteau to include in the Annual Report to the Congregation. Stay tuned!
- Session approved letting the staff off the three days between Christmas and the New Year and paying the four salaried non-exempt employees for those days.
- The numbers of people served by our Resource Center and Food Bank site remain high even as open hours are curtailed. We appreciate our volunteers.
- Property Committee reports that the air handler for Trinity Hall is on order. The committee is adjusting room rates for outside groups as those groups will need to meet in our Sanctuary building. They are also monitoring our insurance rates as we are no longer responsible for the old education building or the duplex.

- Session provisionally approved the 2023 budget as they were presented with monetary totals for each division on the balance sheet. Line-item amounts will be presented in January for further approval. Most committees planned to keep the same budget they had in 2022.
- Session affirmed the Stewardship & Finance Committee's decision to open a new account called Short Term Reserve with New Covenant Trust. This account is set up for the purpose of investing the receipts from the sale of the education wing but allowing potential quarterly withdrawals. The committee is grateful to their financial adviser Jim Hitson for his availability and advice.
- Worship Committee and our choir are receiving many positive comments about the wonderful Cantata presentation and the new garland decorating the sanctuary. Please convey your appreciation for the Cantata and Mini-Concerts with beautiful music to Lynn Moser, Bruce Chamberlain and all the others who make these events happen.
- Session members prayed for congregants in need of special care and concern. We are grateful that Gerry Pearson, our bookkeeper, is out of the hospital and doing better. We are grateful she can continue her work at Trinity while a search continues for her replacement as she retires.


