PASTORAL LETTER

As schools have opened, and children and teachers have returned to their classrooms, I want to take a few moments in the September newsletter to write about how much we - as Christians of the Reformed and Presbyterian tradition - value Christian education. I can begin from the starting point of Jesus himself, whose message was a combination of proclamation and education. Jesus proclaimed from his first sermon that with the Messiah's arrival, the kingdom of God had drawn near. Christ made this proclamation over the three years of his work, but he also educated his listeners on the meaning of the kingdom through many memorable parables, metaphors, and instructions.

The Apostle Paul, an extremely educated individual, carried on Jesus' work through his letters, which were primarily instructional and theological. Because of Pentecost, Paul knew that his readers acknowledged Christ as Lord and Savior, but as the early faith communities struggled with the working out of their confession, Paul offered clarity through his vast religious, historical, and theological knowledge enabled by his spiritual relationship with Christ.

This combination of spirit and knowledge established the pattern that would continue to inform Christianity through its 2000-year history. After Paul, that pattern emerges in the writings of the early church fathers and mothers, monastics, and scholars. During the age of Roman Catholic Christendom, when the church was a vast political entity, voices began to emerge that called for the church to return to its spiritual and Biblical roots. The earliest voices called for the word of God to be translated into the common languages of the people. This idea met with so much resistance from Christendom that a new movement began – the Reformation.

The Reformation was driven by a desire for believers to understand their faith so they could share it and live it with others. This desire demanded two things – the translation of the Bible and a literate popula-

tion to read it. The Reformation had spiritual, social, and political ramifications from which we continue to benefit today. The value of literacy was no longer taken for granted; the freedom of believers to express and live out their faith within their particular communities was no longer prohibited; the politics of the church no longer defined or dominated the government, and a renewed value for science, technology, and education drove the vast social revolution known as The Enlightenment.

Reformed Christianity still teaches that our faith tradition is a partnership between the Triune God and the human mind. That is why we educate our children and our adults on what it means to be a disciple of Jesus Christ. Furthermore, that education never stops, because it is spirit-driven, and the Holy Spirit adapts our discipleship to the time in which we live. Imagine if our schools were using the same methods and teaching the same topics in the same way as schools taught two hundred years ago. Education is always a matter of applying the past to the present, and the practical application of our faith in Jesus makes the same demand upon Christian Education. September is the month of Rally Day, when our church recognizes the gift of Christian Education as we return to the post-summer task of teaching and learning about what we believe, why we believe, and how we express our beliefs in our daily lives. We will be using some of our new technology to not only reach our congregation, but beyond the walls of Trinity and into the human community. I hope you will join us and help us in that task.

MISSION NEWS

An Interview with Elmaric Parker

In 2017, Elmarie and Scott Parker came to Trinity to tell us about their mission work in the Middle East. Elmarie is the PCUSA Regional Liaison for Iraq, Syria and Lebanon. Scott was Associate to Ecumenical Partnerships at that time. The Mission Committee Zoomed with Elmarie this year on Friday, August 17. We wanted to know how Presbyterian mission work is going in the area that has suffered from the port explosion in Beirut, the earthquake in Turkey/Syria, the financial collapse in Lebanon, and the status of surviving refugees, Christian congregations and schools after wars in Iraq and Syria. Elmarie is in the US for a few months. She tuned us in from Oregon. After a little update about what Trinity has been up to recently, she asked us to hear stories from the agencies she works with.

There is the story of a Christian church in Aleppo (I didn't know Aleppo was Nineveh in Jesus' time) that was taken over by Isis during the war in Syria. It was damaged by bombing but is now an active church and school (1800 students) that cares for many congregants who are widows and orphans of the war. In this community the church is more than a place of worship, it is a gathering place for medical aid, food security and counseling.

In August 2020, an explosion in the port of Beirut destroyed the homes of 300,000 families. Businesses in the area lost everything. The Middle Eastern Council of Churches began a Community Resilience Program to help the families and businesses. Prior to the explosion, in 2019, there was a financial collapse that exists today in Lebanon. Inflation is at 200-500%! There is no middle class. The Community Resilience Program (run by the MECC) gives out vouchers to families to help with some income (not lire but dollars). Gasoline is so costly and families must decide between rent and gas to drive to work.

In February, 2023, there was a devastating earthquake in Turkey that affected Syria as well. The Presbyterian Disaster Relief plan and so many agencies that Elmarie represents responded with aid immediately. We saw a movie about blankets and food being distributed to the earthquake victims.

The last story was of the building of a Contact and Resonance Center near Byblos where the beautiful mountains of Lebanon meet the sea. This center will be a farm, housing, a restaurant/shop and a guest house for the disabled. The center will take 3 years to build and is now in its second year of construction.

There are over 20 separate Christian agencies (NGO's) that Elmarie networks with. I asked her what she would like to do with the donations we will send her from Trinity. Is there one overwhelming need? She said donations go to provide grants and she would prefer we choose the targeted program. She will send us the link to which the check will be made out and we can stipulate the program in the memo. It was news to me that U S sanctions put on Syria and Lebanon don't only hurt the rich. The Syria-Lebanon Partnership Network (of the Presbyterian Church) will be meeting with the U S Treasury and the State Department at a conference in Washington D.C., September 26-28th. Elmarie invited us to register for the conference (hybrid). It is called Loosening the Chains: Advocating for Sanction Relief for Syria and Lebanon. I marvel at the work of the Presbyterian Church and the active power of God to bring justice and mercy to The Middle East through mission workers like Elmarie Parker.

Casa Alitas Program

Churches in Tucson are preparing travel snack bags that contain five packaged snacks given to the migrants who are getting on planes & buses here in Tucson. Volunteers meet at Trinity Presbyterian Church every other Wednesday to pack the brown bags. Each time we have packed over 500 bags. To help please contact Billie Holbrook or Steve Barlow.

SESSION NOTES

Session returned to work after a July hiatus. There was one piece of business in July that was resolved with a quick electronic meeting, so no one missed a minute of their summer break. Session updated Trinity's Corporate Resolutions so that our newly elected Treasurer Ruth Russell will be allowed to conduct our investment and banking needs. Otherwise, the August meeting was routine as you will be able to see from the business highlights that follow.

- The clerk reported to Session that the Minutes Books review from Presbytery de Cristo showed only one or two discrepancies for the years 2019, 2020 and 2021 while there were no discrepancies for the year 2022.
- The Deacons and the Growth & Outreach Team have looked over the membership rolls to update them and have suggested several persons for removal as they are out of state or their whereabouts are unknown. Right now, our membership number rests at 166 members and that number will decrease after the next Session meeting when those names will be suggested for roll removal.
- Administration & Personnel Committee held their annual pastor review with Dr. Mack and wished him well during his two-week vacation at the end of August.
- Session approved Growth & Outreach Team's suggestion that Trinity have a booth along the route during the October 29, 2023 Cyclovia event. This year Cyclovia will be turning the corner outside Trinity church at 4th Avenue and University Blvd.
- Mission Committee approved giving Scott and Elmarie Parker \$1,000 from the Special Mission Fund. Scott and Elmarie Parker have spoken at Trinity several years ago and are Presbyterian Mission Partners for Iraq, Syria and Lebanon.
- Mission also approved giving \$386.40 from the Pentecost Offering to Southern AZ Aids Foundation for use at the Thornhill Lopez site on 4th Avenue for LGBTQ youth.
- The new Trinity Hall air handler is being installed! Thank you, Property Committee and anonymous donor!
- Worship Committee is proposing an All Saints concert in the Trinity Chapel for Wednesday evening, November 1, 2023 with musical presen-

- tations and candlelight. Something new to look forward to!
- Lynn Moser is in the early stages of researching ways, people and companies to restore the Trinity organ. The possibilities are myriad.
- The program committees Worship, Christian Ed, Mission, Growth & Outreach, Stewardship & Finance and the Deacons are being tasked to present ideas for the next five years or so to move Trinity PC into the future. For example, what can we determine for the future use of the Trinity Hall kitchen? Time for some discernment and vision.

Session members prayed for those in need of special care and concern and, in particular, those suffering from weather-related storm damages.
