PASTORAL LETTER



One of my favorite old hymns is "Have Thine Own Way, Lord" (which was in the Presbyterian "Redbook" of the Southern Presbyterian Church.) The opening line of the hymn is "Have thine own way, Lord, have thine own way. Thou art the potter, I am the clay. Mold me and make me after Thy will, while I am waiting, yielded and still." The scriptural reference for that beautiful verse is found in Jeremiah 18: "Just like the clay in the potter's hand, so are you in my hand, O house of Israel."

In this passage, Jeremiah envisions a shapeless lump of clay, without form, meaning, or purpose. The potter begins to spin the wheel and mold the clay into a new creation. God is the potter of Jeremiah's vision, and God's people are the clay, a people who exist for God's own creative purposes. Jeremiah presents a deeply spiritual image of how the people of God, then and now, are to view the meaning of life and our place in it.

While Christ doesn't use this image in his own teaching, he constantly speaks of the creative spirit that will come after his death and resurrection, and how that spirit will shape our lives to fit God's ultimate purpose: "I have said these things to you while world that thrives on selfishness, but everything I am still with you. But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you." (John 14: 25-26)

If we are to affirm our faith in God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, then we must also affirm that God is the potter and we are the clay. Anyone who has watched potters perform their art knows that the creation of a vessel is a turbulent process involving spinning, shaping, and baking. Committing one's life to Christ demands that we open ourselves to God's creative spirit, and in doing so we will feel spun, shaped, and put to the fire.

The Christian conscience does not allow us to have a convenient faith empowered by cheap grace. If we allow Christ to shape our lives, we must change the way we see ourselves and those around us. In changing our view of our place and purpose in the world, we then must act as God calls us to act. We cannot sit still in the face of suffering, intolerance, and injustice. We also cannot rationalize our sinfulness. Rather, we must feel the pain of our wrongdoing, so that we can experience the joy of forgiveness. In addition, the spirit will not allow us to be occasional in our commitment or seasonal in our worship.

Do we put God into our hands as we feel the need, or do we place ourselves into God's hand as God needs us? To place God into our hands is idolatry - it is to make God into an object that exists for our purposes and at our convenience. Christ made it clear that those who would be his disciples must humble their hearts and place themselves wholly into God's hands. God is the potter – we are the clay, and there can be no other way.

It is not easy to surrender so much of oneself in a made of the world eventually falls into decay and obsolescence. It is God alone, through the love of Christ and the presence of the Spirit, who can make us new each day, each hour, each heartbeat and beyond. Are you on the potter's wheel? It is easy to get there – all we need do is ask, and then let the work begin!

Good news! Let's all welcome Karen James as a new Trinity member. At the October stated meeting Session approved that Karen join our Trinity family by Reaffirmation of Faith. Please give her a warm welcome. Many of us already know her from her activities at Trinity and by her regular attendance. Her pre-pandemic Compañera was Holly Clark and her post-pandemic Compañera was Billie Holbrook. We are so glad to have a new member on our rolls! Other Session business follows:

- The Deacons announced that a baby shower will be planned for all of us to welcome Sanani's and Felix's new son, Aziel.
- Session approved allowing Trinity Presbyterian Women to sell raffle tickets for three quilts that have a rich heritage at Trinity. Two long-time members, now saints, Libby Huffman and Mary Wong began the quilts. They have been finished by Ruth Myers and Bonnie Stull. Proceeds from the raffle ticket sales will benefit Trinity's Food Bank site during the holidays ahead.
- Growth & Outreach Team plans to sell Trinity swag in November to augment holiday items for our Food Bank patrons.
- Administration & Personnel Committee will be working with Mission Committee to write a new position description for Mission Facilitator after the tragic death of DeDe Markin.
- Everyone is missing DeDe. But people are stepping up to fill a giant void. Volunteers at the Food Bank are carrying on the work. Janet Munson will bring treats for fellowship time in Fellowship Hall before worship. Sheila Croteau will print ID vouchers to be handed out at the Food Bank while the DES work will be handed off to another party. Drivers are helping pick up food for the Food Bank and Peter Holbrook has ac-

- quired a food handler certificate. Still, there will be things we will all miss such as the decorating and the cakes!
- Stewardship & Finance Committee will launch a 2024 Commitment campaign in November.
- Session approved Stewardship & Finance Committee's motion to approve making available \$6,500 from the Capital Maintenance Reserve Fund to bring in several different organ-building companies to assess repair or replacement options for our old and ailing organ. Lynn Moser has been in close conversations with these companies after lots of research.
- Property Committee reports that work on the Trinity Hall air handler is ongoing.
- Property Committee plans to meet with Bruce Chamberlain and Lynn Moser to discuss the work of improving the lighting in the Chancel area before any changes are made.

Session and Dr. Mack prayed for DeDe's grieving family, for Rose Emery in rehab, for Anne McConnell in the hospital, for the Middle East, for earthquake victims and we gave thanks for the Rev. Brad Munroe's sermon on October 15th with the message that absolutely nothing can separate us from God's love.


